While all people share baseline health care needs, the LGBTQ population is also at a higher risk for specific medical problems 3 Those who identify as LGBTQ are diverse and from many socioeconomic backgrounds, races, ethnicities, and cultures

Improving Healthcare for LGBTQ Populations

2 Health systems should not discriminate on the basis of sexual identity or orientation, gender identity, and/or intersex status 3 Graduates of Canadian medical schools should be competent in providing care to LGBTQ patients, as well as in collaborating with LGBTQ peers/professionals in a respectful, inclusive and culturally sensitive manner 4

competent health care Members of the LGBT community are more likely than their heterosexual counterparts to experience difficulty accessing health care Individuals in same-sex relationships are significantly less likely than others to have health insurance, are more likely to report unmet health needs, and, for women, are less likely to have
